

# CLERGY CORNER WITH CANTOR JEN

#### We Can Make A Difference Together.

y now, you have probably heard something about my trip to El Paso, whether through social media, at our Tisha B'av service, or in one of the articles I've written for other publications (see the link on our website if you would like to read more). I went to

add my voice to the chorus of faith leaders calling for ethical treatment for immigrants. I witnessed first-hand the power that faith leaders and faithful people have in standing up to injustice. What I didn't expect was that my role as clergy would lead me to experience up close the devastation that these inhumane policies are inflicting on those who seek the promise of this country. As families filed into the shelter from buses that had brought them to us from detention, I could feel their exhaustion and their fear. I held their children with the smell of the camps still clinging to them and their struggle seeped into me. I won't ever forget it, and I can't ever accept it.

I am not the only person in our community who has traveled to the front lines of the border crisis. In June, our own Kitty Wolf went to Homestead, FL to protest at one of the most infamous detention centers in our country that was at the epicenter of the child separation crisis. She joined

the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism and many other faith groups in an ongoing protest. Every day for months, these groups held vigil outside of the fences, through which they could see children walking in single file lines while guards looked

on. Just recently, those children, some of whom had been imprisoned for months, were moved out of that detention camp.

Public pressure from faith and activist groups led our government to stop detaining children at that cruel facility. It took months of frustratingly hard work. It took sustained pressure on public officials. It took extreme cooperation from groups of diverse backgrounds. But it worked. These voices, grounded in faith, were heard and their call was heeded.

This is what it means to pray with your feet. As a community of faith, bound by the values of justice and kindness toward all people, we have more power than we realize to create change in the world. Torah teaches us that we are obligated to engage in this work. As a part of our commitment to the Religious Action Center's Brit Olam, Ohef Sholom has joined an immigrant justice cohort. This will connect us with other congregations who are taking up this cause and provide us with resources to maximize our efforts. In the coming weeks, we will be exploring the ways that we can organize and use our collective voice to ensure that the strangers in our land are treated ethically. As a kehilah k'doshah -- a holy community, we must rise above politics and take action together, fulfilling our part of our covenant with God.

The work will be hard, and we will not finish it, but Pirkei Avot teaches us that we cannot opt out. As our efforts come together, I ask you to join us. Email me at cantorjen@ohefsholom.org if you would like to be involved. Let us make sure that one day, when our children or grandchildren ask us what we did to stand up to the injustice of this time, we can answer that we leaned into our values and engaged in the holy work to create the world we long to see. \$\phi\$

## SISTERHOOD UPDATES: Uniongrams Are Here!

hef Sholom Temple was one of the founding members of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS) in 1913. Since then, the NFTS has updated its name to the Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ). One of the early innovations of the NFTS was to create an organized way to send written messages to people. Out of this desire, Uniongrams were created. The name, Uniongram, represents two organizations who were strongly connected to the NFTS - the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC, now URJ) and Hebrew Union College (HUC, now HUC-JIR).

Uniongrams have always been sold to raise money and since 1955 the funds have supported the WRJ YES (Youth, Education and Scholarship) Fund. Our local Sisterhood uses the money raised as part of the revenue supporting our many activities. Uniongrams were once referred to as "a Jewish message for a Jewish people" so order your Uniongrams to support the WRJ and our own Sisterhood causes. ## Carpool Café Presents a Film Screening of Nobody Wants Us: SS Quanza

n September 11, 1940, the SS Quanza docked in Norfolk to load coal. On board were more than 80 Jewish refugees from the Holocaust. Turned away by Mexico, and now being turned away by the U.S., the passengers were being sent back to Nazi-occupied Europe. Their story is the subject of an important new documentary that will be shown on October 6, at Ohef Sholom. Several local Jewish

families, including several congregants, played a role in providing food and comfort for the refugees. One of them, Elise Margolius, is featured in the film. Others included members of the Gerst, Kaufman, Nusbaum, and Rosenberg families.

The documentary was produced by Washington, D.C. filmmaker Laura Seltzer-Duny. The OST Archives provided some of the source material



for the film and is sponsoring the mid-morning program. Men's Club is providing food. There is no charge for the event, but donations are welcome, with proceeds to go towards the film company's efforts to create educational materials to accompany the film and make it more accessible to schools around the country. An invitation will follow, with a request for RSVP's to ensure there is seating (and food) for all who attend. A question and answer period will follow the screening. \$\phi\$

#### IN THE ARCHIVES WITH ALICE

Continued from the August issue of the *Temple pOST Bulletin*.

#### A Look Back at Our History, Part V: Ohef Sholom's Fifth Twenty-Five Years (1944 - 1969)

anuary of 1944 marked the beginning of America's third full year as a combatant nation in the Second World War. As war raged abroad, many congregants saw service in the armed forces, including Assistant Rabbi Joseph Levenson, who served in the Army's Chaplain's Corps. Here at home, congregants did what they could to support the troops through organizations like the USO and Red Cross. Congregants planted Victory Gardens, invited service members stationed in the area to

enjoy home cooking and hospitality, and served in the Auxiliary Aircraft Warning Service, keeping watch for enemy planes that might enter America's airspace.

It was also in January of 1944 that the

congregation's beloved 62-year-old Rabbi Louis Mendoza formally announced his intention to resign "after the war." In November, he handed in his official letter of resignation, giving September 1, 1945, as the intended date. Some might have wondered at his prescience when the war officially ended just two weeks prior to that date.

Several candidates were considered as his replacement; and on August 27, 1945, just a few days before Mendoza's stated retirement date, Rabbi Bernard J. Starkoff of Cleveland, Ohio, accepted the pulpit. Feelings were mixed over some of the new rabbi's ideas, and less than two years later, at the May 1947 annual congregational meeting, Rabbi Starkoff "asked for the floor" and announced his decision to leave the congregation and the rabbinate. However, perhaps the experience in Norfolk contributed to a fortuitous career change since Starkoff then went back to Ohio, went into his father-in-law's publishing business, and became a multimillionaire.

The Board wasted little time in finding a replacement for the outgoing rabbi. Meeting immediately after the close of the annual meeting, the Board appointed a committee to "visit other

congregations" and make recommendations. The first name to be mentioned was that of a 32-year-old assistant rabbi from Philadelphia, Rabbi Malcolm Henry Stern.

Stern's candidacy was not without controversy due to his involvement in the American Council of Judaism. The Council had been formed five years

earlier by a group of Reform rabbis who opposed the creation of a separate Jewish Army under the British in Palestine. For some of its founders, this was segregation. Their opposition was rooted in the conviction that Judaism should be considered a separate religion and not a separate nationality. However, some of the founders carried this belief further, opposing the creation of a separate homeland for the Jews. Although after the Holocaust some of its founders recanted their earlier opposition, there was uncertainty about Stern's position and whether his political views would influence his service to the congregation. He assured the Board that it would not, and his outstanding academic and pastoral career, his wartime career as a chaplain, and his strong interest in interfaith activities carried the day. Stern was elected, though, with a close vote of 83 to 73.

Stern served the congregation until 1964. In addition to continuing Rabbi Mendoza's tradition of strong interfaith involvement, Stern's rabbinic career was marked by his active involvement in the religious school and his love of music. In fact, he was editor-in-chief of the *Union Songster for Reform Judaism* and co-editor of songs and hymns for *Gates of Prayer: the New Union Prayerbook.* Stern is known internationally as the author of genealogical texts, which not only brought new knowledge to thousands but also served as a major source for Stephen Birmingham's 1981 book *The Grandees: America's Sephardic Elite.* Stern is also remembered for his Civil Rights advocacy. In the words of one of his colleagues, Stern "fought for the civil rights of

## The URJ's Congregational Benchmark and Assessment Program

his fall we will be participating in the URJ's next Congregational Benchmark and Assessment Project. This URJ program was created in 2016 to help congregations compare their internal data to congregations of like demographics.

The project offers three assessment tools that leadership uses to get information about their congregants and congregational trends in order to make data-driven decisions:

- The Financial Benchmarking Tool will help us gather and analyze data about our congregation's demographics and key financial markers.
- The *Congregational Survey* will help shed light on the involvement of our congregants in Temple life. The survey also allows for comparison of results with other congregations by creating local and national benchmarks.
- Board Self-Assessment Rubric facilitates an examination of congregation's leadership, mission and governance.

As participants in the URJ Congregational Benchmarking and Assessment Project, we will receive guidance from a URJ mentor who will help us understand the data, set priorities, and connect to

African Americans at a time and a place where such a stand was both unpopular and dangerous."

The 1940s and 1950s were marked by several momentous events here at home, nationally, and internationally. Here at Ohef Sholom, the ritual of Bar Mitzvah, which had been discontinued in 1907, was reintroduced in 1948. The same year, Sabbath School

was changed to Sunday School. A new social hall, improved classrooms and kitchen, and a small library were added to the building. Nationally, the era saw the beginning of the Civil Rights Movement. In 1951, three years before the Supreme Court's

Brown v Board of Education called for desegregation of the nation's schools, Stern organized an interracial Sunday night service at the Temple, and in 1958, Ohef Sholom Temple was one of several houses of worship used for tutoring sessions for students locked out of their schools by Virginia's Massive Resistance policy. Several congregants were instrumental in getting the courts to reverse that policy early in 1959. Finally, on the international stage, in 1947, several congregants were instrumental in the repair and resupplying of the SS Exodus 1947, whose passengers' fate contributed to the birth of the modern state of Israel.

The 1960s brought new plans for expansion of the building, but it also brought the end of Rabbi Stern's tenure at Ohef Sholom. In 1964, Stern resigned to accept the position of Director of the Rabbinical Placement Commission. He was replaced by Rabbi Harold D. Hahn, who made changes to both the Friday night service and the religious school, adding

elementary Hebrew to the curriculum. There were more changes as the building expansion was completed in 1965. A year later, Ohef Sholom Temple Youth (OSTY) was formally organized. As the decade drew to a close, Ohef Sholom began preparations to celebrate its 125th anniversary, but the resignation of Rabbi Hahn forced the congregation to once again find a new rabbi. The preceding years had brought many changes. There had been changes in ritual, four different senior

rabbis had graced the pulpit, and the building had undergone renovation and expansion. However, what remained unchanged was a belief in the Temple as a source of faith and learning, loyalty to its Jewish heritage and its American roots, and belief in its goal to make the world a better place for all people. \$\Pi\$

### WHO'S NEW? Meet Alicia & Eric Shoulta.



Welcome Alicia & Eric when you see them around Temple!

Ohef Sholom congregation and choir.

Eric's perspective is from the choir seats, and the angle his wife Alicia enjoys is usually from the first or second row on the right side of the Sinai Chapel floor. There she sits with a group of mostly 20-to-40-somethings who call themselves, lightheartedly, the "Jew Crew."

For the Shoultas, residents of Norfolk's Lafayette-Winona, this is tantamount to being "home." Officially converted to Judaism earlier this year at a joy-filled Friday evening service, Eric and Alicia are almost invariably surrounded by large circles of people at the casual oneg Shabbat. From the start, they have savored the sense of community here, as well as the religious teachings and practices that have been handed down over thousands of years and are now theirs.

"Judaism is more about doing than believing," says Alicia. "This makes so much more sense" because of its emphasis on good deeds and ethical living.

"Other cultures have ingested so much of Judaism, without most people realizing it," Eric explains. "Our system of laws, our ethical precepts – so much of it is rooted in Judaism."

He says the latitude allowed in Reform Judaism contrasts sharply with the dogmatic approach to knowing God that he grew up with as a Catholic in central Kentucky. "I have nothing against

Catholicism, but it was not a 'home' for me," he says. "I disagreed with much of the theology, tried to get aligned with it several times, but I found myself floating."



Alicia's Christian background was based on church-centered youth activities. When the people in the youth groups faded away, she recalls, so did her interest in her religion.

The spark to examine Judaism as an alternative was Eric's but they reached the same conclusion together. "We are a team in pretty much everything," he says.

"I wanted to look into the religion myself because I was not going to be pushed into something," says Alicia, who, in her working life, is senior campaign manager for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's Hampton Roads chapter. "I needed to find interest in Judaism on my own, not just because my husband was interested in it."

So they studied. They liked, as Eric puts it, that "Reform Judaism allows you the freedom to engage the *Mitzvot* in your own way and in your own time."

They had a mentor in the form of Ohef Sholom congregant Kathryn Morton. Eric, in the Navy and stationed at Information Warfare Training Group Norfolk, went to Israel with the USS Iwo Jima as part of a 2018 deployment. He also had help from the rabbi aboard the USS Oak Hill as he began his formal conversion process.

Like a proper naval officer, he reported back to Alicia.

By then, Alicia was already attending some services at Ohef Sholom. Inspired by members and teachings, she told Eric, "This is our Temple."

Their Temple activities go a long way to make it so. The Jew Crew provides dining-out and hanging-out camaraderie for both and the choir position offers Eric, who also plays guitar and piano, opportunities to indulge his musical interests. "I think my voice
